18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25 26	Petitioner, ROBERT WESLEY COWAN, through undersigned counsel, hereby request equitable tolling of the statute of limitations governing his petition for writ of habeas corpus. U.S.C. § 2244(d)(1). Pursuant to § 2244(d)(1), the limitations period for Mr. Cowan to file his petition for writ of habeas corpus expires on May 15, 2020. Mr. Cowan requests equitable tolling for ninety (90) days, to and including August 13, 2020. In support thereof, Mr. Cowan states:

I. Extraordinary Circumstances

A. COVID-19

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared a global pandemic. The outbreak relates to the novel coronavirus, or COVID-19. COVID-19 is a highly contagious respiratory illness that causes fever, cough and shortness of breath. See Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-

B. Circumstances Particular to Mr. Cowan's Case

As set forth in the attached declaration, there are circumstances relevant to Mr. Cowan's case that, in light of the pandemic, that are extraordinary and prevent him from timely filing his petition. The Federal Defender has assigned a team of attorneys, investigators and paralegals to represent Mr. Cowan. On the team, we have one person who is over age 70. That team member is an investigator. We have four members whose children are home from school because their school districts have cancelled classes. We have one team member who has a child with a compromised immune system.

We have been diligently working on Mr. Cowan's case. We have identified potentially meritorious claims that require additional investigation. At least one of those claims requires the assistance of an expert.

There is additional work left to do. Our investigators must interview witnesses, both in California and out-of-state. Because of the age of this case (the charged offenses took place in 1984), most of the witnesses are elderly. Our client is 71 years old. Because of the extremely contagious nature of the illness, we are not visiting our client. Further, we are heeding the advice of the CDC and suspending all travel related to the case.

The Federal Defender's Office today implemented mandatory telework for all employees. While the attorneys will be able to continue working remotely, the investigators and paralegals will not be able to accomplish necessary tasks, such as interviewing witnesses and collecting records. The Federal Defender does not have enough laptops to assign to each employee; as of now, only attorneys are assigned laptops.

Finally, we have a retained an expert to assist us in developing a claim. We retained that expert in February. Subsequently, the expert had to travel to Europe to settle the estate of a family member. That expert is still in Europe and is unsure when he will return to the United States. In order to form his opinion, the expert has requested that we arrange an in-person visit with Mr. Cowan.

II. Equitable Tolling Is Justified in These Circumstances

The statute of limitations in § 2244(d)(1) may be equitably tolled for extraordinary circumstances that prevent a diligent petitioner from timely filing. *Holland v. Florida*, 560 U.S. 631, 649 (2010). As described above and in the attached declaration, the global COVID-19 pandemic presents such extraordinary circumstances.

In order to protect Mr. Cowan's statutory right to assistance of counsel to prepare his federal petition for writ of habeas corpus, we seek ninety (90) days of equitable tolling. We have no idea what the state of the pandemic will be in August, but we are certain that we are unable to carry out our responsibilities to Mr. Cowan and file a federal petition by May 15, 2020.

Undersigned counsel contacted Deputy Attorney General Lewis Martinez, counsel for Respondent, by telephone on this day to ask whether Respondent would oppose this motion. Mr. Martinez was consulting with his supervisor and was unable to take a position before Petitioner filed this motion.

DECLARATION OF JENNIFER MANN

- I, Jennifer Mann, declare as follows:
- 1. I am an attorney licensed to practice law in the State of California. I am employed by the Federal Defender for the Eastern District of California Capital Habeas Unit. Along with Assistant Federal Defender Alyssa Mack, I represent Robert Wesley Cowan in these habeas corpus proceedings. This declaration sets forth the circumstances justifying equitable tolling of Mr. Cowan's 28 U.S.C. § 2244(d)(1) statute of limitations, which expires of May 15, 2020.
- 2. As discussed in the Motion, we are experiencing a global pandemic. According to the World Health Organization, novel coronavirus, or COVID-19, began in China in December 2019. Since then, it has spread to 148 countries and led to 6,610 deaths. The United States to date has 3,813 cases.
- 3. COVID-19 is highly contagious.
- 4. In response to the pandemic, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends that persons at high risk of contracting the disease (the elderly and those with serious medical conditions), postpone travel until the pandemic has passed.
- 5. The Federal Defender has assigned a team of attorneys, investigators and paralegals to investigate and prepare Mr. Cowan's federal habeas corpus petition. Such investigation involves multiple in-person visits with our client, in-person witness interviews and extensive travel. On our team, we have one person who is over age 70. That team member is an investigator who is required to travel. We have four team members whose children are home from school because their school districts have cancelled classes. We have one team member who has a child with a compromised immune system.
- 6. On March 16, 2020, the Federal Defender instituted mandatory telework for all

- employees. All staff must work from home. We have been directed to avoid unnecessary in-person meetings, including client visits.
- 7. We have been working diligently on Mr. Cowan's case. We have interviewed multiple witnesses in California and in other states, met with Mr. Cowan many times, reviewed the existing files and obtained documents that have not previously been obtained. We are investigating those claims and preparing to present them in this Court and to exhaust any new claims in state court.
- 8. Our investigation has revealed potentially meritorious claims that have not been raised on Mr. Cowan's behalf. Our investigation into those claims is ongoing. At least one such claim requires the assistance of an expert witness. That expert told us that he needs an inperson meeting with Mr. Cowan to formulate his opinion.
- 9. The expert we retained in February had to go to Europe to settle an estate for a family member. We contacted him today. He is still there and is unsure when he may return.
- 10. We have identified a large number of witnesses whom we need to interview, both in California and in other states. Because of the pandemic, we have suspended travel and in-person witness interviews. Because of the age of this case (the offenses occurred in 1984), most of the witnesses we must interview are elderly. Our client is 71 years old. We do not want to put him or witnesses at risk by conducting in-person interviews. Our client will be unable to speak with us by telephone because of the order directing us to vacate the office and work from home. We will continue to work on Mr. Cowan's case from home as best we can.
- 11. In the exercise of my reasonable professional judgment, the extraordinary circumstance of the COVID-19 global pandemic will prevent us from providing Mr. Cowan with effective assistance of counsel unless his statute of limitations is equitably tolled to allow

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us to complete our investigation.
