LIZ DAILY is an Assistant Federal Public Defender and the Appellate Chief in the District of Oregon. She has worked on numerous district court and appellate court cases involving challenges to Bureau of Prisons policies and procedures. Before joining the Federal Public Defender in 2014, Liz worked as an appellate defender in Oregon and a trial-level public defender in Brooklyn, NY. She also clerked for the Immigration Courts in Seattle and Portland. Liz is a 2006 graduate of Lewis & Clark Law School.

STEPHEN R. SADY is the Chief Deputy Federal Public Defender for the District of Oregon where he represents clients at the trial level, in habeas corpus proceedings, and on appeal. He graduated from Antioch College in 1973 and from Lewis and Clark Law School in 1977. After three years representing migrant farm workers with Evergreen Legal Services in Sunnyside, Washington, he moved to Portland where he has been defending charges involving the full array of federal crimes since 1981. He has taught constitutional criminal procedure as an adjunct professor at Lewis and Clark Law School and, in 1990, lectured on United States criminal law in Colombia

through a Fulbright grant. His extensive litigation involving Bureau of Prisons matters included argument in the Supreme Court regarding good time credit calculations. He writes and teaches on subjects including federal sentencing, pretrial motions, appellate advocacy, representation of Guantánamo prisoners, and post-sentence challenges to the use of prior convictions to enhance sentences.
